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Data and Research strategy 2024-2026



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1. Introduction

The review of the 2020-2023 research strategy noted that all but two essential elements had been delivered, and recommended that in any future strategy the Commission focus its limited resources on:

- collecting and analysing data, providing access to the expanded CSV download of the *register of charities*
- sharing headline figures and data from reports with Commissioners as well as senior management
- where possible, carrying out some research in collaboration with others.

The development of the *Data and Research Strategy 2024-26* has been shaped by these recommendations, taking into account the Commission's strategic aims, relevant recommendations of the Independent Review of Charity Regulation, the planned introduction of a registration threshold, budget and staff resources. It has also been influenced by feedback from the Commission's stakeholder forum, the charity sector and critical friends.

The strategy has been designed to gather information:

- on whether charity trustees have noted a change in the Commission's culture towards being more enabling.
- that will inform the development of the Commission's policies and processes.
- that would be useful to the charity sector, other stakeholders and the public.

1.2 Structure of the strategy

The strategy is set out in five sections:

- Research objectives
- Resources
- Stakeholders
- Implementation
- Evaluation

2. Research objectives

The Commission's *Strategic plan 2023-2026* sets out four strategic aims which are designed to respond to recent legislative changes and the priority recommendations of the Independent Review of Charity Regulation.

The research objectives in this new strategy are focussed on monitoring and measuring the achievement of the Commission's strategic aims, as set out below.

Strategic aim	Research objective

4. Developing as a properly governed, transparent and independent decision-making body.	Gather and analyse internal data to identify evidence of the Commission's ongoing development as a properly governed, transparent and independent decision-making body.

3. Resources

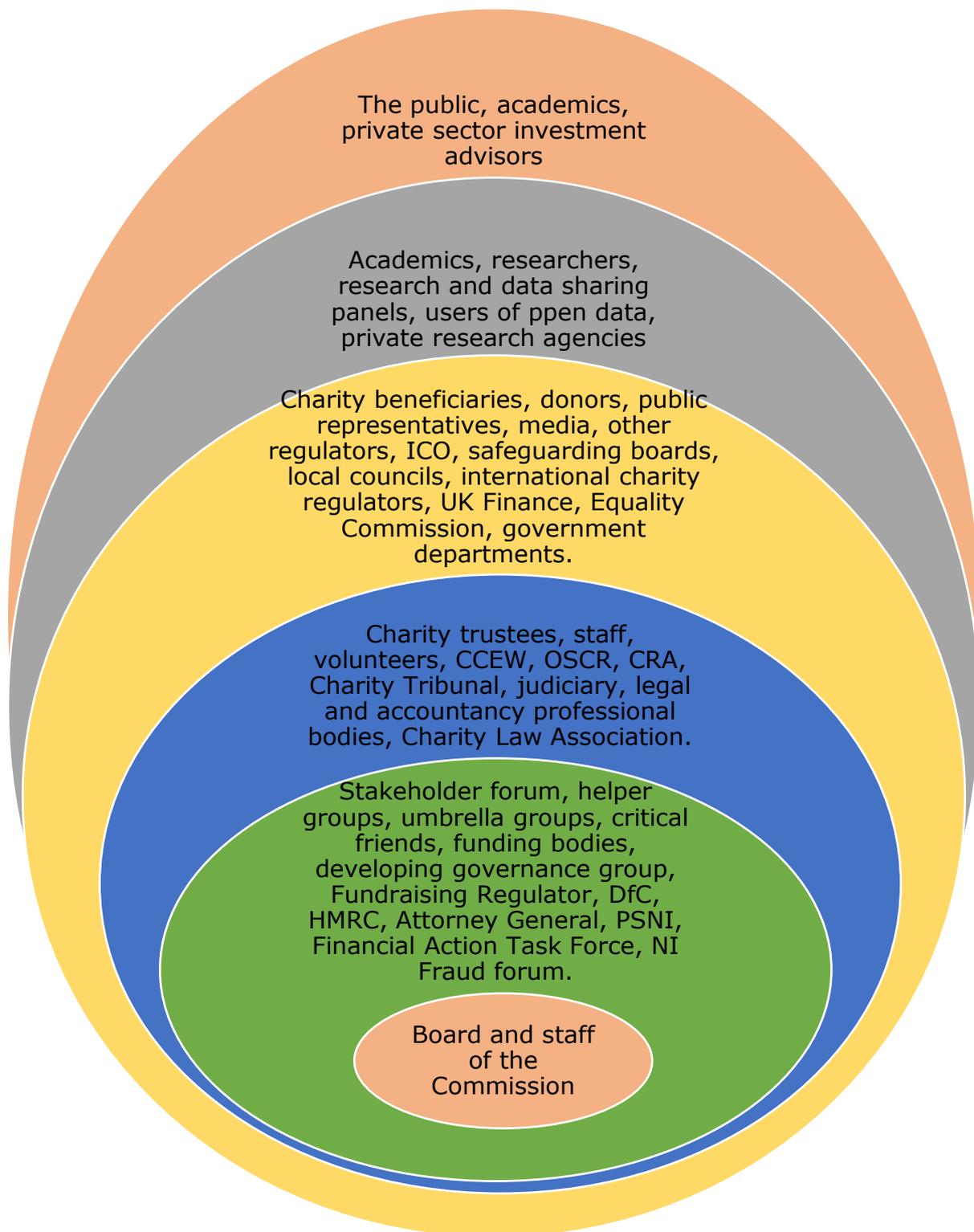
A key assumption underlying the development of this strategy is that, given the fiscal situation confronting the public sector, there will not be a budget for research conducted by external agencies. In addition, implementing some of the recommendations of the Independent Review of Charity Regulation require changes which will consume a large portion of the Commission's budget for the next number of years. For example, the redesign of the website and changes to the Commission's IT system that will be required to manage a registration threshold when it comes into operation.

Therefore, the research strategy objectives will be achieved through analysis of data gathered by the Commission. The key resource will be staff time, enhanced, where possible, by collaboration with the sector and others, including academia where possible.

4. Stakeholders

In preparing the research strategy we have identified a range of stakeholders who have an interest in, or benefit from, the charity sector. In some cases, these groups and individuals are the audience for the research reports we publish. In other cases, they are a key source of information. A number are potential partners or collaborators on research projects. The diagram at Figure 1 shows the main stakeholders we have identified. A key to organisation names which have been shortened in the diagram, is below Figure 1.

5. Implementation

Implementation of the strategy is aligned with the Commission's strategic planning cycle. Delivery will be managed through the policy and research team.

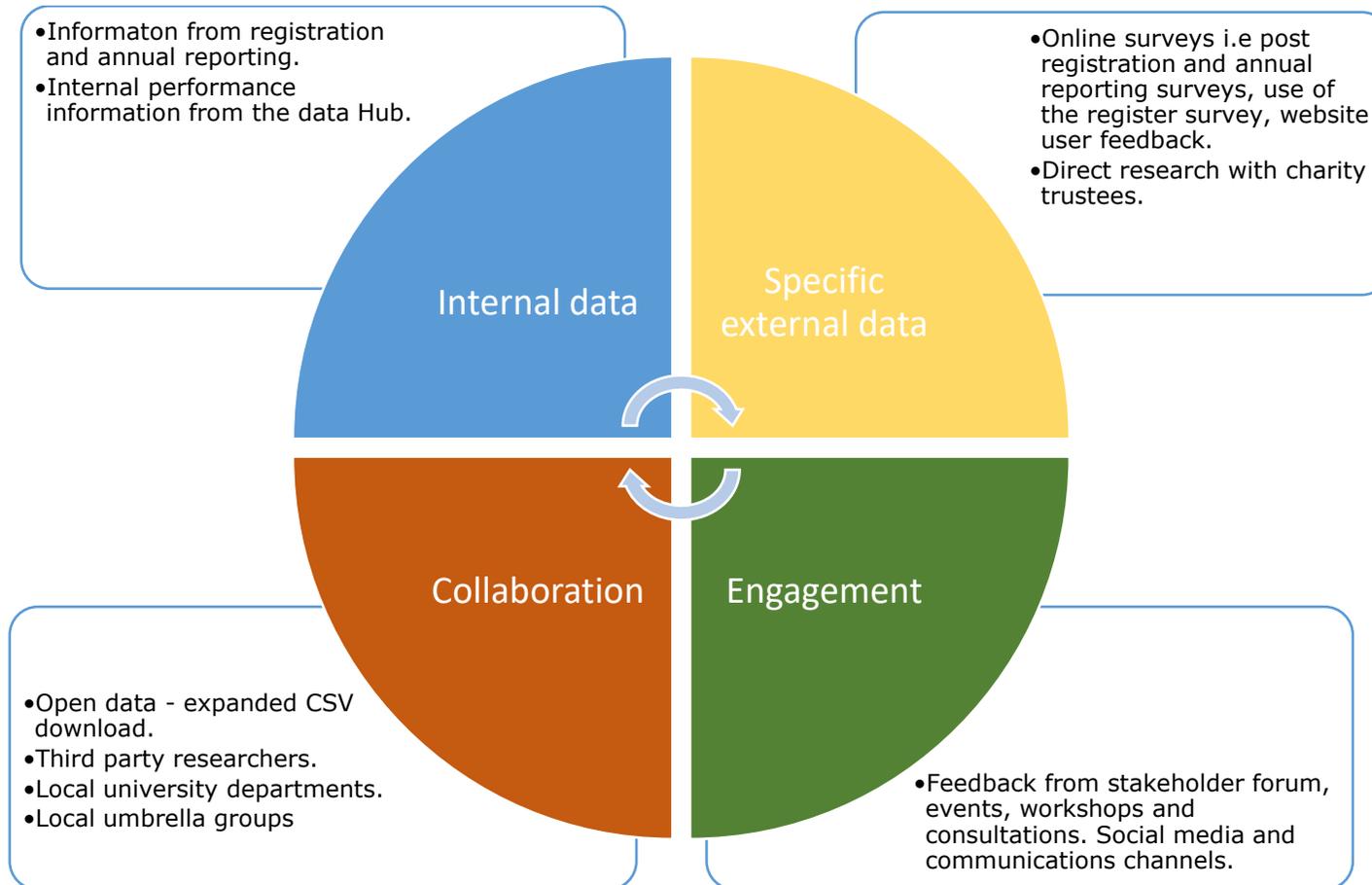
Specific tools that may be employed will include:

- analysis of Commission database information for specific programmes.
- pulse surveys with cohorts of charity trustees, officers and volunteers.
- online pop-up surveys for specific programmes.
- use of online surveys integrated with the expanded download of information from the *register of charities*.
- where possible, collaborative work with the sector.

The research methods used to deliver the strategy are primarily surveys and questionnaires, through which we will gather both quantitative and qualitative data. The Commission will invite cohorts of charity trustees to participate in Commission pulse surveys depending on the focus of the survey. For example, if questions concern smaller charities or charities with particular types of beneficiaries.

The research strategy may draw on four main sources of information as set out in the diagram below:

5.1 Research plan

The tables below set out how we intend to achieve each of the research objectives, subject to internal resources. Each table links the research objective to the relevant strategic aim set out in the Commission’s strategic plan and records the activities we will undertake to achieve the objective. This includes an indication of what we will measure and a timeline for completion. Each objective has also been assigned a level of priority, either essential or desirable. If internal resources become stretched, this prioritisation will help us to adapt the research strategy in response.

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5.2 Implementation plan

As noted in the introduction, this strategy has been developed amid the dynamic and challenging context of the planned introduction of a registration threshold, continued implementation of recommendations from the Independent Review of Charity Regulation and ongoing budget constraints.

In response, the strategy sets out research objectives which have been designed to gather, analyse and report on feedback regarding the delivery and achievement of three of the Commission's strategic aims.

During the life of the strategy, elements may be reprioritised in response to changed circumstances for example limited resources, emerging priorities and stakeholder needs.

A detailed timeline for the implementation of this research strategy is set out below.

Implementation timeline – this timeline shows the key research activities that will be undertaken for each research objective. The activities are coloured coded: essential  and desirable .

6. Evaluation of the strategy

The *Data and Research strategy 2024-2026* will be reviewed and amended throughout its duration. Key performance indicators will be mapped against objectives with progress monitored and reported to the Senior Management Team (SMT). Reports will be delivered to SMT:

- on completion of key elements of the strategy.
- in September and March each year. These update reports will include details of outputs and outcomes achieved.
- with any emerging challenges and proposed solutions being raised with the SMT through the policy development manager's monthly report.

A review of the strategy will be conducted to evaluate indicators of success, identify learning. This learning can then be integrated into the work of the Commission to inform any subsequent research strategy, especially the public trust and confidence survey to be carried out in 2026–2027.

This full review will be conducted within six months of the strategy's end date in 2026.

A mini review will be conducted at the end of year one of the strategy's implementation (by end of Quarter 1, 2025-26). The strategy will also be reviewed in response to a significant change in circumstances, for example if other priorities arise or internal resources become stretched. To try to avoid the need for major changes to the strategy, research identified as essential makes up the greater part of the strategy.
